Water Awareness Month Is Here WVWD Launches Series of Money Saving Rebates, Online Workshops, Giveaways & More

In celebration of Water Awareness Month, Walnut Valley Water District (WVWD) has reopened to the public and launched a series of specialized programs to increase water use efficiency and fight against water waste.

Now available, two new rebate programs. A \$50 pool cover rebate available to all residential customers, the application and detailed information is available at wvwd.com/conservation. Along with a commercial (CII) urinal rebate, a supplemental \$150 rebate in addition to the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California's (MWD) \$200 rebate, totaling a savings of \$350 per urinal. - [\\$50 Pool Cover Rebate](#) - Don't let your water savings evaporate! Pool cover purchases qualify for a credit of \$50 to your monthly water bill.
- [\\$350 Urinal Rebate](#) - Save water and money with every flush! This rebate is available for ultra-low water and zero water urinals for all commercial customers.

Join WVWD in celebrating our most precious natural resource all month long! The District is now offering:

- **Potted Plant Giveaway** – As customers return to the customer service lobby to pay their monthly bill or request service, they will take home a WVWD potted plant. *Available while supplies last, safety protocols such as facial masks and a minimum of six feet between all individuals are strictly enforced.*
- [Little Free Library](#) - Located in the front of the customer service lobby, visitors now have access to a collection of water awareness and education books.

- [Conservation Workshops for Mandarin Speakers](#) - These one-hour classes are taught live on Zoom and feature three available courses: California Friendly® and Native Landscapes; Turf Removal and Garden Transformation; and Garden Design.
- [Landscape Transformation Workshops](#) - Transform your yard into a water-efficient oasis. These classes go hand-in-hand with MWD's Turf Replacement Program, which offers homeowners a \$2-per-square-foot rebate for converting lawns to more water-efficient landscapes.
- ['Save the Drop' Giveaway](#) – Every customer that registers for a virtual indoor/outdoor water survey will receive a reusable 'Save the Drop' water bottle in addition to a customized conservation kit.
